Choose one of the Scottish political parties to research. Record at least 5 facts about the party in your home learning jotter.	Design a poster to demonstrate your understanding of the different angle types and their properties.	Use either your class novel or a book of your choice and select 5 words that you do not know the meaning of. Use a dictionary to find the definitions and record in your jotter.	Log on to Borrow Box using GLOW, or by downloading the app on a phone or tablet/iPad. Select an eBook or Audio book to enjoy.	Ask someone at home to give you some sentences. See if you can up-level these sentences by adding more exciting openers. (Maybe you could add more exciting vocabulary, connectives and punctuation too).
Try and read at least two books at home this term. Write a book review for each and bring them in to share with the class.
